The BSA training program provides a way to prepare all of our leaders in a common understanding of the aims, methods, and resources of the Scouting program.

#### **Future Training Opportunities:**

## Trainer's EDGE Course (D69, 2 credits) - Saturday, March 9th

The purpose of the Trainer's EDGE course is to provide and help develop the platform skills of a trainer with a focus on the participant, while raising the level of skill a trainer brings. Only practice can polish these skills, but this course is intended to "train the trainer" on behaviors and resources while offering hands-on experiences in methods and media.

## Wood Badge (A90, 6 credits) - July 29<sup>th</sup> - August 3<sup>rd</sup>

Wood Badge is a Scouting leadership program and the related award for adult leaders in the programs of Scout associations throughout the world. Wood Badge courses aim to make Scouters better leaders by teaching advanced leadership skills, and by creating a bond and commitment to the Scout movement. Courses generally have a combined classroom and practical outdoors-based phase followed by a Wood Badge ticket, also known as the project phase. By "working the ticket," participants put their newly gained experience into practice to attain ticket goals aiding the Scouting movement. This summer, the Nevada Area Council's Wood Badge course will be held at Camp Lee with Kathi Colbert as the Course Director.

## National Youth Leadership Training (S78) - August $5^{th}$ - $10^{th}$

National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT) is the current incarnation of youth leadership development training offered by the Boy Scouts of America. The program is conducted at the Council level and is intended to provide standardized, in-depth training covering a number of leadership ideas and skills for Boy Scouts, Varsity Scouts, and Venturers. This training is an element of the overall leadership training program. It is open to both boys and girls. NYLT is run by youth leaders under adult supervision. The Youth Course Director runs course meetings and events, chairs meetings of the team leaders' meeting, delegates duties to other youth staff, assists the Course Director, models the learning and leadership skills, and recruits participants. This summer, the Nevada Area Council's NYLT course will be held at Camp Lee with Creon Sant as the Course Director. All youth age 13-20 are invited to attend. Boy Scouts and Varsity Scouts must have earned the rank of First Class.

Campfires can be the highlight of an entire campout. Learn new and exciting ways to involve Scouts and parents.

#### **A114 Flag Etiquette (8:30-9:30)**

How to treat Old Glory and give her the proper respect that she deserves. Proper flag etiquette at its best.

#### A117 Knots & Ropes (12:45-1:45)

Learn how to teach basic knots to your Cub and Boy Scouts. Use knot tying as part of your program.

#### A119 Leadership & Training Knots (1:45-2:45)

Learn about the BSA adult leadership and training awards. These are usually presented as knots to be worn on the uniform. In addition, leadership can provide great opportunities to develop long-lasting and meaningful relationships and improved self-confidence.

#### **A123 Scouting & the Internet (2:45-3:45)**

#### A126 Songs, Skits, and Cheers (11:40-12:40)

#### **A129 Uniforming (9:30-10:30)**

#### A135 Basic Will & Estate Planning (2:45-3:45)

#### A150 Paperwork, Paperwork, Paperwork (12:45-1:45)

#### A154 Journey to Excellence (9:30-10:30 *OR* 1:45-2:45)

"Scouting's Journey to Excellence" is the BSA's performance recognition program designed to encourage and reward success and measure the performance of our Units, Districts, and Councils. It replaced the Centennial Quality Awards Program as a means of encouraging excellence in providing a quality program at all levels of the BSA.

#### A155 Writing Pack, Troop, Team, or Crew Policy Manuals (10:30-11:30)

Well-run organizations ensure everyone knows what is expected and what needs to be done. Documenting policies and procedures gives everyone the same expectations on the what, how, when, and even sometimes why of a Scout organization's regular operations. Why policies are needed, how to adopt them, and how to make them work for you.

#### A156 Internet Advancement (10:30-11:30 *OR* 1:45-2:45)

Welcome to the internet age. Now that the use of internet advancement is mandatory, it's time to learn the system inside and out. Tips on how to make the process as painless as possible.

#### A160 Bullying (8:30-9:30)

Considered one of the most critical issues facing youth today. Learn what the BSA suggests that leaders and parents do to address these issues before and after a bullying event takes place to make your units a safe haven for youth.

#### A161 How & Why to Conduct an Interfaith Worship Service (12:45-1:45)

#### H28 Scouting in the LDS Church (2:45-3:45)

When properly carried out under the direction of priesthood leaders, Scouting supplements activities of boys and young men ages eight to eighteen. Complete a CPR Course with the American Red Cross or other recognized public agency. Be prepared to save a life!

#### S65 Outdoor Skills Instruction: Dutch Oven Cooking (9:30-11:30)

Tips and strategies for cooking with Dutch ovens. Learn what can and can't be cooked this way, temperature control, and how to care for ovens. Includes safe food handling practices, recipes, how to teach the Scouts. Participants will prepare part of the day's lunch menu.

#### **C206 Easy Cub Scout Crafts (2:45-3:45)**



The Den Chief is an older Boy Scout, Varsity Scout, or Venturer who works with a Cub Scout or Webelos den. He is selected by the Scoutmaster, Coach, or Advisor in cooperation with the Cubmaster. He may be of any age or rank, but he can be the greatest help if he is a former Cub Scout and if he is mature enough to assume this important responsibility. As a selected leader of younger boys, the Den Chief has the opportunity to help them complete their Cub Scout or Webelos Scout advancement requirements and to live up to Cub Scouting's ideals in their everyday lives. The Den Chief is a member of a leadership team which also includes the Den Leader, Assistant Den Leader, and the Denner. The Den Chief is already what every Cub Scout and Webelos Scout would like to be - a Boy Scout. As far as the younger boys are concerned, he or she is the person they would most like to follow, and that makes the Den Chief a natural leader for them

This one day training experience is intended for those Boy Scouts, Varsity Scouts, or Venturers who would like to serve in a leadership position while giving service to brother Cub Scouts. Elements of this training include:
